## WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS!!!



The 2007-08 John Jay College men's basketball team made history this season as they won their first ever CUNYAC men's basketball championship. The Bloodhounds, the No. 6 seed in the 43rd annual tournament, defeated the top seeded and two-time defending champion, York College, 68-54, in the championship game.

John Jay (14-16, 6-7 CUNYAC), defeated the College of Staten Island, 63-59 in the quarterfinals and put away New York City Tech, 73-70, in the semifinals to earn their third trip ever to the conference championship game, and their first since 1990.

Hakeem Kased averaged team-highs 14.7 points 7.7 rebounds and was named

the tournament's Most Valuable Player. Meanwhile teammate Vaughn Mason garnered a spot on the All-Tournament team after scoring 10.3 points per game and knocking down a team-best seven three-point field goals.

With the win, the Bloodhounds earned their first ever berth into the NCAA Division III tournament where they faced Moravian College in the first round, coming away with an 80-74 win. John Jay then traveled to Amherst, Mass. to take on two-time defending national champions Amherst College. The Bloodhounds fell 96-74, ending their tournament run in the second round.

## Rifle Hits Mark Again, Wins Fourth Championship In Last Five Years



The rifle team came out on top as the Bloodhounds, for the fourth time in five years, took home the gold winning the Mid Atlantic Conference rifle championship.

John Jay won in both disciplines, winning in small bore 2028-1909 over Massachusetts Maritime, and in air rifle John Jay fired a 2131 to defeat SUNY Maritime (2095) and Massachusetts Maritime (1984).

As all season long, Stephen Wilson

fired a team-high in both disciplines. He drilled a 562 in small bore and recorded a 548 in air rifle to lead the Bloodhounds to victory.

Teammate Dmitry Gordeychuk ripped a 524 in small bore and a 517 in air rifle to help distance the Bloodhounds from the competition. Jenny Cho fired a 478 in small bore and a 538 in air rifle, while Michael Gorini drilled a 464 in small bore to round out the discipline. In air rifle Ema Andritoiu had a 528.

## Department Inducts Four All-Time Greats Into Hall Of Fame

It was a night of champions for the John Jay College of Criminal Justice athletics department as four of its all-time greatest athletes were inducted into the department's Hall-of-Fame. Former pistol shooter William Allard ('74), men's basketball player Greg Andrew ('96), softball player Carrie Raffone ('04) and baseball and men's basketball player Derrick Tinsley ('93) were all inducted into John Jay's elite of elite.

Allard, a retired police officer who served with the New York Police Department from 1961 to 1981, was a member of the John Jay pistol shooting team for two years (1971-72) and led the team to a number one finish in the nation during the 1971 season. He was a National Rifle Association All American in 1970, and he was the 1968 pistol shooting New York State champion. Allard's other notable accomplishments include the winner of the Service Pistol championship at Quantico, Va. and the winner of the U.S.A.F. Provost Marshal Pistol Match in 1973. He won nine gold medals at the Canadian Olympics in Foy, Canada in 1974, and won a National Civilian Pistol Championship in 1982.

Andrew was a four-year member of the John Jay men's basketball team (1991-95). He is John Jay's all-time leading scorer, recording 1565 points. He saw action in 96 games and had a career average of 16.3 points and 6.2 rebounds per game. He had a career shooting percentage of .488 (624-for-1280) and scored a career-high 45 points in an 82-49 win at Vassar College on Feb. 10, 1995. Andrew was also a City University of New York Athletic Conference first team All-Star during the 1994-95 season after averaging 23.9 points per game that year and set a John Jay record for most points in a season

Raffone was a two-year member of the softball team (2001-02) and set numerous NCAA records both years en route to being named the CUNYAC Player of the Year each season. In 2001, Raffone led John Jay, CUNYAC and NCAA in slugging percentage (1.176), RBI per game (2.35), home runs (15), and runs (63). Additionally, she was second in the nation that season in batting average (.565). In 2002 Raffone did more of the same, leading the nation in batting average (.584), RBI (64), RBI per game (2.0), slugging percentage (1.150), and triples (11). She also belted 11 home runs that season to lead the conference.

In her two years, Raffone had a saw action in 63 games, had 221 at bats and had a career batting average of .574 (127-for-221) with 26 home runs, 137 runs batted in, 18 doubles, 17 triples and 127 runs.

Tinsley was a multi-sport student-athlete with the Bloodhounds as he was a four-year member of the baseball (1981-84), and men's basketball teams (1980-81, 82-85). As a baseball player Tinsley was a conference All-Star in 1983 and '84. In '83 he led the team in doubles (9) and RBI (32) and he shared the team lead in homeruns (4) that season. During his senior year, Tinsley batted .341 and led the Bloodhounds in runs (25), RBI (23), stolen bases (9), and hits (29).

On the hardwood, Tinsley scored 895 points in 95 games (8.9 ppg). He averaged a career-high 13.7 points per game during his senior year and was a CUNYAC second team All-Star that season.

The John Jay Athletics Hall of Fame was founded to honor, pay tribute and perpetuate the memory of those individuals who, either through participation, support or interest, have made outstanding contributions in the field of intercollegiate athletics and who have helped bring recognition, honor, distinction and excellence to John Jay College of Criminal Justice.

## Spring Sports Off To Fast Start

The John Jay spring athletes are off to a blazing start this season. Already, five Bloodhounds have earned awards from CUNYAC after tremendous performances in the early portion of the season.

Three baseball players have already been honored by the conference as Jorge Rosado and Chris Nastasi were both named player of the week this season and Nico Rivera snagged rookie of the week on March 17th. Meanwhile softball player Marlenne Nunez garnered the conference's top weekly softball honor, while men's tennis player Dong Shao was named the men's tennis Rookie of the Week on Mar. 24. Additionally, the three spring teams have held their own in battle.

The baseball team is off to a 7-9 start this season. After a southern trip to start the season where they played tough competition, including nationally ranked Augustana College, the Bloodhounds have won six of their last eight games since returning north. And the defending conference champions defeated Baruch College in two of three games during a weekend series the final week of March.

The softball team got off to a 3-0 start after knocking SUNY Maritime in a season opening doubleheader on Mar. 15 and downing New Jersey City Univ. in the home opener on Mar. 18.

Men's tennis cruised to a 9-0 season opening win against conference foe New York City Tech. John Jay has also faced quality non conference foes Rutgers-Newark and Western Connecticut
